The school district's grading program, Home Access Center, will allow parents the ability to access their child's grades using a provided username and password (Ben Lippert and Rene Embrey, HAC Facilitators-ongoing).

Teachers will routinely contact parents on an individual basis by phone or e-mail to communicate about their child's progress (Principals and Classroom teachers - ongoing).

Junior High North will provide report cards to parents via the Home Access Center every grading period to show their child's academic progress (Lesa Speck, registrar-quarterly).

The Junior High North Family and Community Engagement Plan will be posted to the district's website by August 1. Printed copies will also be available upon request.

Signatures to indicate receipt of Family and Community Engagement Plan via the district website will be obtained through the online new student and back to school registration through the online registration platform. Junior High North will distribute an informational packet each year, which includes a description of the school's Family and Community Engagement Plan and a survey for volunteer interests. The packet will also outline the family-school communication system described above. The principal of Junior High North will designate one certified staff member who is willing to serve as Family and Community Engagement Facilitator. The Family and Community Engagement meetings will be offered at various times and formats to help accommodate different family schedules (Jessica Moser-ongoing).

Junior High North teachers and staff will be trained in that parents play an integral role in student learning and their contributions are valuable to our students' success (Charlotte Sandage-ongoing).

In order to reach out to parents and communicate with them as equal partners, teachers will hold conferences with parents of children in their classrooms, providing information regarding their child's grades and assignments, explanations of homework and grading procedures, and suggestions to help coordinate school-parent efforts to support their children in a format and language parents can understand (Classroom Teachers-ongoing).

Junior High North will work with Cabot Middle School North to help provide a smooth transition from one school to the next by raising parent awareness of procedures and related activities. Junior High North will implement and coordinate special orientation programs for parents and students to help the transition and to build ties between home and school. Parents will be welcomed into our school building to meet teachers and staff at the beginning of the school year. Teachers and staff will seek parental support and assistance to set students up for success at Junior High North (Principals and Counselors-Spring 2023).

Junior High North will provide descriptions of the school curriculum on our website and during course registration in the second semester. Junior High North will also provide parents with individual student assessment results and interpretation.
